

- Thursday & Friday, November 27-28 for Thanksgiving break.







TUTOR TIPS

"Isn't this just common sense?"

I was sitting in my first graduate-school class. The course title was "Adult Development." Our professor was a rockstar in the adult education field (yes, there are recognized scholars in this little recognized discipline). As we examined theories of how adults move through their adult lives, physically, psychologically, sociologically, emotionally, etc., I thought I'd died and gone to heaven. Here we were examining in depth how, where, and when adults proceed through life. Because we qualified as adults (defined as over 18 and having job/family/other responsibilities), we could compare the research on adult learning with our own experiences. As a young widow, responsible for 2 teenage sons, a Connecticut Yankee in the deep South, far away from family, I welcomed this chance to reflect and discover a path forward. Luckily, I landed in a program that concentrated on learning for and by and with adults.

A little history in broad strokes: believe it or not, up until the 20th century, little attention was paid to adults as students in the United States. You graduated from high school or college or not, started a job and worked until you didn't/couldn't. Eventually, perhaps in part because of ongoing English

language literacy classes for immigrants, educators realized that adult audiences may learn differently from children. They may be motivated differently.

Thus developed the broad academic field of "adult education." This umbrella term refers to any formal and informal learning adults engage in. It includes literacy programs like LVWC and HR corporate training and community organizing. Now, of course, "life-long learning" is a catch phrase, and continuing education programs abound. Many professions require CPE credits. All those life and career coaches you're offered are engaged in adult education.

In our program, we examined many studies and theories of how adults learn applicable at LVWC. We discussed assumptions about adult learners: that they are practical, task and problem oriented; have valuable life experiences to build on; are ready to learn at different phases of life; and tend toward self-direction. We investigated whether there are cognitive/psychological stages or phases in the adult's growth. We looked at differences/similarities in the trajectories of men and women lives. We inspected adult behavior in groups and individually. I found all these studies fascinating because we could always compare our own experience with our readings. I ended up writing my dissertation on "Conditions that Foster Learning in Online Communities" (way before Facebook!) because of my own professional participation in an online community.

Nowadays, we take for granted that adults can and do change/develop as they age. My fellow grad student's comment in our adult development class, "Isn't this just common sense?" ('this' being a discussion of traits of the adult learner) indicates how far we've come in understanding the adult student.

Thank you for joining us in this circuitous path of adult learning-yours, theirs, ours!
